Information for parents

What are the SATs?

- Statutory Assessment Tests
- More formal way of testing pupils compared with KS1, e.g two at a desk, working in silence.
- Same test is taken all over the country on the same day
- Reports to parents and to the local authority include a mixture of teacher assessment levels and test levels. This will be explained in more detail later on.

Why do we do them?

They show what level your child is currently working to

- They give teachers the chance to see how children are doing in comparison to their peers not only within the same school, but also nationally.
- SATs are a useful tool to see how well a child has progressed from KS1 to KS2, and they also give secondary schools a base to compare against when the time comes for your child to leave Year 6 and make the journey up to KS3!
- Head teachers, Local Authorities and the Department for Education also use SATs data to identify how primary schools are performing.

SATs jargon

Expected level/standard: A score of 100 means that your child is working at the expected standard.

Raw score: This is the number of marks your child can get on the tests.

Scaled Score: This is a score that is converted to allow SATs results to be compared year on year. This helps to take into account particularly difficult test years and other factors.

KS2 Maths SATs:

Paper 1 is the arithmetic paper which will last for 30 minutes. It will contain fixed response questions where children have to give the correct answers to calculations.

Papers 2 and 3 will involve a wider range of question types including multiple choice, true or false and reasoning based. Both papers will last 40 minutes each. 2018 national curriculum tests



When are the tests?

Key stage 2

The key stage 2 tests are timetabled from Tuesday 9 May to Friday 12 May 2023.

Access Arrangements

Certain children will be eligible for:

- Extra time
- Reader
- Transcriber
- Amanuensis
- These arrangements will already be in place and part of usual test practice.

Who has to sit the tests?

All children working at or just below the expected standard and who have completed the Key Stage 2 programme of study must take the tests.

Pupils working too far below the expected standard may not sit the test- teacher to decide.

All pupils need to be in school for the week.

How are the tests marked? KS2 tests are marked externally.

Each child will receive:

a raw score – the actual number they received in their SATs
a scaled score – a conversion score that allows results to be compared year-on-year confirmation of whether or not they achieved the national standard

What about writing?

There is no writing test. Teachers will assess children's writing based on what they have produced independently in school over the year.

What is reported in terms of writing?
Working towards the expected standard
Working at the expected standard
Working at greater depth within the expected standard.

Working towards the expected standard

The pupil can:

- write for a range of purposes
- use paragraphs to organise ideas
- in narratives, describe settings and characters
- in non-narrative writing, use simple devices to structure the writing and support the reader (e.g. headings, sub-headings, bullet points)
- use capital letters, full stops, question marks, commas for lists and apostrophes for contraction mostly correctly
- spell correctly most words from the year 3 / year 4 spelling list, and some words from the year 5 / year 6 spelling list*
- write legibly.¹

Working at the expected standard

The pupil can:

- write effectively for a range of purposes and audiences, selecting language that shows good awareness of the reader (e.g. the use of the first person in a diary; direct address in instructions and persuasive writing)
- in narratives, describe settings, characters and atmosphere
- integrate dialogue in narratives to convey character and advance the action
- select vocabulary and grammatical structures that reflect what the writing requires, doing this mostly appropriately (e.g. using contracted forms in dialogues in narrative; using passive verbs to affect how information is presented; using modal verbs to suggest degrees of possibility)
- use a range of devices to build cohesion (e.g. conjunctions, adverbials of time and place, pronouns, synonyms) within and across paragraphs
- use verb tenses consistently and correctly throughout their writing
- use the range of punctuation taught at key stage 2 mostly correctly[^] (e.g. inverted commas and other punctuation to indicate direct speech)
- spell correctly most words from the year 5 / year 6 spelling list,* and use a dictionary to check the spelling of uncommon or more ambitious vocabulary
- maintain legibility in joined handwriting when writing at speed.²

Working at greater depth

The pupil can:

- write effectively for a range of purposes and audiences, selecting the appropriate form and drawing independently on what they have read as models for their own writing (e.g. literary language, characterisation, structure)
- distinguish between the language of speech and writing³ and choose the appropriate register
- exercise an assured and conscious control over levels of formality, particularly through manipulating grammar and vocabulary to achieve this
- use the range of punctuation taught at key stage 2 correctly (e.g. semi-colons, dashes, colons, hyphens) and, when necessary, use such punctuation precisely to enhance meaning and avoid ambiguity.[^]

[There are no additional statements for spelling or handwriting]

When do the KS2 SATs results 2023 come out?

- For Key Stage 2 children, SATs results day is 4th July 2023 (we allow the children to write these down so they can let you know after school that day).
- By this date papers will have been marked by the external examiners and the raw marks converted into a scaled score.
- Schools must submit teacher assessment judgements for writing, reading, maths and science by 27th June 2023.
- Test results will be reported to parents along with teacher assessment judgements in writing, reading, maths and science as part of the Annual Report to parents.

Teacher assessment

On the printout that comes alongside the Annual Report, 'Greater Depth' is not an identified level. Teachers can only assess the children as expected or not (except for Writing).

If your child receives a scaled score of 110 or above in their SATs then they are in the 'Greater Depth' category.

We will identify your child's level on our school Annual Reports.


